Question:

We all know that Jesus was sinless from birth. He was God but yet born into this world of sin as a man. I truly believe that Jesus remained sinless his entire life but, I'm confused some. We all know that selfishness is a sin and that if you think about it, there is none more selfish than a newborn child. Consider that Jesus was born into a sinful world, as a child. I remember back to my childhood, not as a baby but as far back as I can remember, I was not even close to sinless. Thinking of a baby that depends on everything from his mother and quickly learns how to get what he needs by crying or whatever he needs to do to get his needs met. With that in mind, was Jesus NOT selfish as a child? Was Jesus a normal child until the age of 12 when he started the work of the Father in the Temple? Again, I believe that Jesus lived his entire life, from baby on being sinless but it's still hard to figure out how that was possible. Maybe this is just like the Trinity. It's hard to comprehend but we just believe it!

Answer:

We are given only a few glimpses of the childhood of Jesus. Luke 2:52 says that "Jesus increased in wisdom and stature, and in favor with God and man." Ellen G. White said about the early life of Jesus, "The powers of mind and body developed gradually, in keeping with the laws of childhood." DA 68. While Jesus followed God completely, and never sinned as a child, He still was a child and developed mentally and physically as any child would.

One could easily argue that the above quotes refer to a time when Jesus was at a stage where He understood the difference between right and wrong, and that He always chose to be right. But what about when He was younger?

At the heart of your question is how can a newborn baby, who is selfish be perfect, if selfishness is a sin? A newborn baby is endowed by God to seek for survival; to get its basic life-sustaining needs met. It's only way of communicating with its mother is to cry. It is calling for mother's milk. An infant is only aware of its own needs. It doesn't perceive the needs of others. This would be better labeled "need-centered." Selfishness, on the other hand, implies someone demanding their own way for pleasure or profit, without proper regard for the needs of others who may be affected by their demand.

A child who cries seeking to satisfy its appetite is hardly different than the teen or adult who goes to the store or restaurant seeking to satisfy their hunger. Neither would normally be considered selfish or sinful. Immaturity is not necessarily an indicator of sinfulness. As a child begins to be more aware of their world they begin to make choices that do have implications of right and wrong. And as they grow they are held accountable by God for making those choices according to their abilities, and not based upon the moral abilities of someone much older.

I see no conflict with the idea that the infant Jesus was perfect, and yet sought to satisfy His own survival needs. As He developed, He learned carefully from His mother and from Scripture and committed Himself to live completely for His Heavenly Father. In this, we, often fall short. He never did.



SWEET POTATO CURRY SOUP

This soup is made with pureed sweet potatoes, ginger, lime, coconut milk and curry paste with just a hint of spice.

Prep time: 10 minutes Cook time: 20 minutes Total time: 30 minutes

Ingredients:

1 Tbsp. olive oil
3 cloves garlic, peeled and minced
3-inch piece fresh ginger, peeled and minced
2-3 Tbsp. green or red curry paste
4 medium sweet potatoes, cooked and peeled
1 1/2-2 tsp. coarse salt
4 cups unsalted vegetable stock
Zest and juice of 2 medium limes
1 1/2 tsp. granulated sugar
1 (15 oz.) can coconut milk
Pinch cayenne pepper (optional)
Fresh cilantro leaves and coconut flakes, for garnish
Directions:
1. In a Dutch oven or stock pot, heat oil to medium-high. Add garlic and ginger and sauté` 30-60 seconds, until fragrant. Add curry past

and ginger and sauté` 30-60 seconds, until fragrant. Add curry paste and stir. Add sweet potatoes. Whisk in stock, and bring to a simmer. Allow to cook 12-15 minutes. Puree, until smooth, with an immersion blender.

2. Whisk in lime zest and juice, sugar, coconut milk and cayenne (if using). Taste and adjust seasoning, if necessary.

3. Serve with cilantro and coconut flakes.
